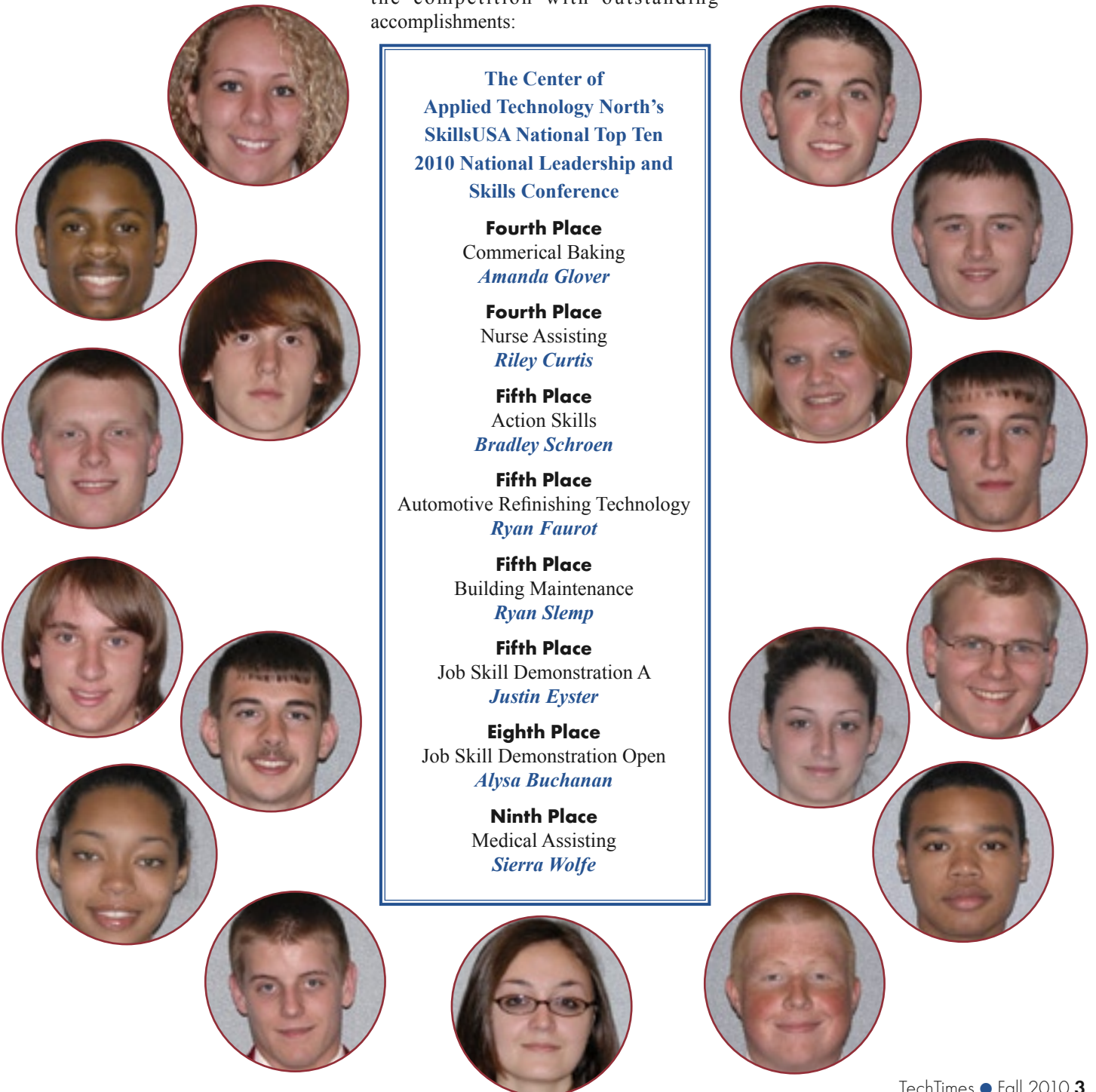

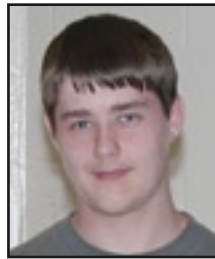

Program Pathways Lead The Way to College and Careers



Program Pathways offer high school students the opportunity to earn free

Anne Arundel Community College (AACC) credit for classes taken in high school. The Program Pathways partnership between Anne Arundel Community College and Anne Arundel County Public High Schools provides students with academic pathways from high school to college and careers. Participants completing Program Pathways can save money on education and reduce the time it takes to complete a college associate's degree. There are Program Pathways in the areas of architecture, business, computer technologies, culinary arts, education, engineering, legal studies, medical assistant, and environmental resource management.

To earn free AACC college credit for high school coursework, complete your high school Program Pathway with a grade of 3.0 or higher, enroll at AACC within a year of high school graduation, and complete six academic credits with a grade of 2.0 or higher. Specific areas of study may have additional requirements.

Masonry and Drafting students from CATN under the direction of Mr. Hoover, Masonry Instructor, took first place for their outdoor oasis in the People's Choice category.

The People's Choice award was determined by the attendees who cast their votes for the projects they liked the best. CATN's design featured a landscaped dining area complete with a fire pit, grill and seating. The materials used were cast concrete, brick and stone, the circular firepit utilizing the stacked stone.

"Extreme Makeover: Home Edition"



When the Masonry Institute called, The Center of Applied Technology North answered...actually, three generations of students and teachers heeded the call. And the call was to summon tradesmen to build an 11,300 square-foot house to be featured on "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition." A two-hour special show chronicling the construction and unveiling aired on Sep-

tember 26th, but the actual building occurred during the week of July 12th, in the height of the dog days of summer when the heat rose well above 90 every day. There was also a monsoon-like rain that delayed the project for two days.

The house in northeast Baltimore is a wish come true for the residents of Boys Hope Girls Hope, an international nonprofit that brings at-risk children with drive and potential into group-home-style settings, helping prepare them for college and life. The Baltimore affiliate has operated a boys' home since 2001 and hoped to launch another for girls, but a capital campaign started in 2007 was

put on the back burner when the economy took a nose dive.

The organization owned a buildable lot a block away from the boys' home. The young men wrote a letter to 'Extreme Makeover' on behalf of the girls, and the request for a girls' home was accepted by the show's review panel.

After saying 'yes' to his business partners at the Masonry Institute, Mr. Hoover and the CAT-North team jumped into action. On that team, including **Curtis Hoover**, were **David Shoemaker**, **Liz Cleckley Fowler**, **Ryan Ribb**, **Henry Young Jordan Garcia** and **James Carr**. All but Mr. Shoemaker were CATN alumni, but there was a twist: Mr. Shoemaker was Mr. Hoover's Masonry teacher, and Mr. Hoover was the teacher of the young men and Liz Fowler, an award-winner as a student and now the director of apprenticeship programs and safety for Pompano Masonry Corporation.

The CATN team's job was a sizeable

one: the behemoth building's exterior is part Federal architecture and part contemporary. The masonry work has an authentic look in keeping with the conventions of the architectural style. The masonry team worked in shifts ranging from 11 to 13 hours. Coordinating with the other contractors, reported Mr. Hoover, was very challenging.

A unique part of the design, reported Mr. Hoover, was the chandelier in the three-story foyer constructed of seven salvaged doors, each decorated with the career aspiration of the seven new residents.

Pennsylvania. *The Farmhouse* has been serving up seasonal, local, organic, sustainable, farm-to-table cuisine for over twenty years. Chef Small is an excellent fit in this venue, says his mentor Chef Davis. Chef Small brings to the table his finely-honed craft that favors European styles, techniques and offerings from the farm-to-table movement.

Chef Small's credits include Sous Chef at the Hyatt Regency in Cambridge, MA. He was an early admission to Johnson and Wales and graduated Magna Cum Laude with degrees in Culinary Arts and Food Ser-

vice Entrepreneurship. As a younger student at the Center of Applied Technology North, Javan was the first Culinary Arts student to take and pass the American Culinary Federation NOCTI exam with a score that earned him the title of ACFEF Recognized Secondary Graduate.

His start at the Center of Applied Technology North has also launched his study under world-renowned chefs in both the United States and Europe including Chef Lea Linster of her own Michelin-rated restaurant in Luxembourg.

"My guest and I thoroughly enjoyed our dining experience at *The Farmhouse* with Chef Small," says Davis of the work of his former student. Davis' entree consisted of sustainably sourced halibut served with gingered kohlrabi and roasted new potatoes with lobster, vermouth and basil pistou. The other diner enjoyed a cornucopia of tastes centered around sustainably raised Colorado lamb chops with smashed sweet peas, caramelized fennel, sweet roasted summer tomatoes and squash.

"The food was exquisite," said Chef Davis.

Since 2003 sixty Culinary Arts students have received Secondary Recognition from the ACFEF. CATN also produced the first three Certified Junior Culinaricians in the United States and since 2008, a total of seventeen CATN graduates have earned their CJC certification.

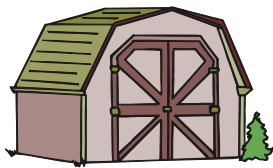

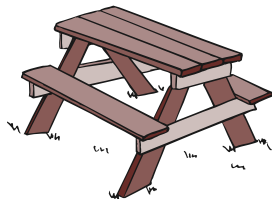
