
The success of Glen Burnie High School has been built upon the collaborative relationships established between staff, parents, students, and the community. Education is a shared endeavor that extends beyond the school campus whereby administration, faculty, support staff, community partners, and parent partners share responsibilities for fostering a positive and safe learning environment for all students. Together we will continue to help our students develop the critical skills necessary to become self-directed, life long learners, with the capacity to excel as compassionate and productive citizens in a diverse and changing world.

Glen Burnie High School possesses dedicated and highly qualified staff members. Thus, our students receive a comprehensive educational program that offers opportunities for intellectual, physical, and social development, as well as the tools to meet and exceed state mandates. Notably, in the 2007-08 school year 214 students took Advance Placement (AP) tests, and 138 of those students received scores awarding them college credit. Seventy-four percent of our seniors either took the SAT or ACT to determine academic aptitude, 45% were accepted to a 4-year college or university, and 24% of those students plan to attend a Maryland college or university. Furthermore, \$2,140,000.00 was awarded in scholarship funds, which was a \$1,040,000.00 increase since the 2005 school year. For the 2008-09 school year, we look to build upon this established excellence by increasing student participation in Advanced Placement and Honors courses, extra-curricular activities, and post secondary education.

As in previous years, we will host an information night for incoming freshman and their parents. This **Freshman Orientation Night** will be held on Wednesday, August 20, 2008 at 6:30 p.m. All parents and students should meet in the Auditorium. Our annual **Back-to-School Night** will be held on Thursday, September 11, 2008. This evening will begin in the cafeteria with a spaghetti dinner from 5:30-6:30 continuing with opening remarks, introductions, and announcements. At 6:50 the structured portion of the evening will begin, allowing for 10 minute visits to each classroom. I hope to see you on September 11, 2008.

Enjoy the remainder of the summer, and I look forward to starting the new school year on August 26, 2008 for grades 10 through 12! **Freshman will begin classes on August 25, 2008.**

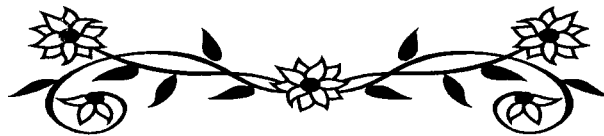

PERSONAL PROPERTY

The Board of Education of Anne Arundel County is not responsible for damage to any motor vehicle parked on Board of Education property at any time. The Board does not carry insurance to cover vandalism, malicious mischief or other acts which might result in damage or loss to personal property.

The same provision applies to any personal property which might be brought into the school or work location or left overnight which subsequently may be stolen, destroyed, or vandalized. We are not able to compensate anyone for damage or loss of personal property.

RAPTORWAVE V SOFT VISITOR SYSTEM

The safety of all students and staff in Anne Arundel County Public Schools is of utmost importance to all of us. Beginning the first day of school in the 2007-2008 school year, our school will be utilizing a new system for check in all visitors. The system is called V Soft by RaptorWare. When you visit our school for the first time, you will be asked to present a government-issued photo ID to a staff person in the school office. This card will be scanned and the following information will be collected: your photo, your name, and your date of birth. This information will be utilized to check you in, create an ID badge, and compare your information against sexual offender databases throughout the country. If your name appears on any of the lists or you refuse to allow the use of your ID, you will not be allowed access to the school. On future visits to a school, in which you have previously registered, you will only be asked to show your ID as your name will be selected from an existing list of previous visitors. You will also be asked to check out with the office upon leaving the school so that we know you are no longer in the building. You will be required to check into the system even if you are only coming to school to pick up your child. The information collected will not be shared outside of the school and is kept on a secure **server**. **Your assistance in keeping our students safe is appreciated.**

VIDEO CAMERA SYSTEM

Glen Burnie High School is equipped with a video camera system. It covers selected interior and exterior public portions of the building and grounds. It is NOT monitored constantly, but it is monitored during emergency situations. During certain events, when the safety or security of students may be in question, authorized personnel from local, state, or federal police or fire emergency units may be given access to view images projected on the camera system. If you have any questions about the system, you should call the Supervisor of School Security at (410) 222-5083.

USE OF DRUG DETECTION DOGS

The Board of education and the Anne Arundel County Police Department have joined in a program to eliminate the use of drugs in county schools. The program will work as follows:

1. At times, unannounced and randomly selected during the school year, county police will bring to the school a dog or dogs trained to detect drugs.
2. The police, the dog(s), and members of school staff will tour school buildings and grounds.
3. If the dog locates a suspected source of controlled dangerous substance in a student's possession, in a student's locker, or in a student's car, the student's parents or guardians will be notified. The student will be subject to the appropriate sanctions provided in law, and to the drug procedures outlined in Administrative Regulation JI-RA.

Thank you for your support of our continued efforts to provide a safe and secure school environment.

CONNECT-ED PHONE MESSAGE SYSTEM INCREASES HOME-SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Anne Arundel County Public Schools just completed its first full school year utilizing an automated telephone notification system called Connect-ED. The system, designed to increase communication between schools and parents, was a resounding success.

Over the course of the 2007-2008 school year, Connect-ED was used to send more than 16,000 messages to parents. Of those, 15,184 were attendance notification calls to households of absent students. Of the 862 calls with systemwide or school-specific messages, more than 85 percent were successful in reaching their designated contacts. The system has quickly become a primary source of information between schools and homes of students, and schools are being encouraged to utilize it even more effectively in the coming school year.

Guidelines have been put in place to ensure parents are not overwhelmed with calls. The school system's Public Information Office will send out school delays and closings as well as some emergency messages (typically sent when parents are at work) when warranted. Individual schools will most often send out "community outreach" messages to inform parents about upcoming special events. Messages will be delivered by e-mail when parents provide e-mail addresses to their child's school.

One note about calls concerning weather-related closings and delayed openings: Such calls must be sent out early in the morning in order to reach the students who will be at bus stops earliest. Typically, such calls will be sent out at about 5:40 a.m. If you do not wish for these calls to go to your home phone (and would prefer for them to go to a cell phone, for instance), simply contact our school and ask that the primary number designation be changed. However, please be aware that this changes the primary number designation for all calls.

Connect-ED numbers are pulled from the student database, which contains phone numbers and e-mail addresses for all students. It is critical that you keep our school updated with the correct phone numbers and e-mail addresses so that we can configure Connect-ED to reach you quickly when needed. Connect-ED will call up to two numbers and send up to two e-mails for community outreach messages, and can call up to six numbers and send up to two e-mails for emergency messages. Attendance notification messages will be sent to the student's primary phone number, which is usually – but does not have to be – the home number, and to up to two e-mail addresses.

The student emergency card has been reconfigured to allow spaces for all of these phone numbers and e-mail addresses. When you fill it out, please make sure to write the numbers clearly so they can be properly entered in our database. Changes in any numbers, whether they are the primary contact number or some backup number, should be reported to the school as soon as possible.

One other note: If you have more than one child in the same school, don't worry. Connect-ED only sends one call per number so you won't receive multiple calls with the same message. The exception to this is attendance notification messages, which will be delivered for every child who is absent.

EL SISTEMA DE MENSAJES TELEFÓNICOS CONNECT-ED AUMENTA LA COMUNICACIÓN ENTRE LA ESCUELA Y EL HOGAR

Las escuelas públicas del Condado de Anne Arundel recientemente han terminado su primer año completo de utilización de un sistema telefónico automatizado de notificación denominado Connect-ED. Este sistema, diseñado para aumentar la comunicación entre las escuelas y los padres, fue un éxito rotundo.

Durante el año escolar 2007-2008, Connect-ED fue utilizado para enviar más de 16,000 mensajes a los padres. De estos mensajes, 15,184 fueron llamadas de notificación de asistencia escolar para las familias de los alumnos ausentes. De las 862 llamadas con mensajes específicos relacionados con la escuela o con el sistema escolar, más del 85% llegaron con éxito a los contactos designados. Este sistema se ha convertido rápidamente en la fuente principal de información entre las escuelas y los hogares de los alumnos, y se está alentando a las escuelas a que lo utilicen de manera más eficaz el próximo año escolar.

Se han establecido reglas para que los padres no sean agobiados con muchas llamadas. La Oficina de Información al Público del sistema escolar comunicará retrasos y cierres de las escuelas y también algunos mensajes de emergencia (que generalmente se envían cuando los padres están en el trabajo) cuando lo ameriten. Las escuelas enviarán mensajes de "integración comunitaria" con cierta frecuencia para informar a los padres acerca de próximos eventos especiales. Los mensajes se enviarán por correo electrónico a los padres que proporcionen su dirección de correo electrónico a la escuela de sus hijos.

Observación sobre las llamadas relacionadas con cierres de escuelas y retrasos en el horario de ingreso debido a condiciones climáticas: Estas llamadas deben realizarse temprano en la mañana para que los alumnos que esperan en las paradas de autobús más temprano sean notificados a tiempo. Típicamente, estas llamadas deben realizarse aproximadamente a las 5:40 a.m. Si no desea recibir estas llamadas en el teléfono de su casa (y prefiere que se realicen a un teléfono celular, por ejemplo), simplemente comuníquese con la escuela y pida que modifiquen el teléfono de contacto principal. No obstante, tenga en cuenta que este cambio afectará el teléfono de contacto principal para todas las llamadas.

Los números que se utilizan en el sistema Connect-ED se extraen de la base de datos de los alumnos, que contiene los números de teléfono y las direcciones de correo electrónico de todos los alumnos. Es esencial que mantenga informada a la escuela sobre los números de teléfono y las direcciones de correo electrónico correctos para poder configurar el sistema Connect-ED de manera que nos podamos comunicar rápidamente con usted cuando sea necesario. Connect-ED llamará a dos números como máximo y enviará hasta dos mensajes de correo electrónico para los mensajes de integración comunitaria, y puede llamar a seis números como máximo y enviar hasta dos mensajes de correo electrónico en lo que respecta a los mensajes de emergencia. Los mensajes de notificación de asistencia escolar se enviarán al teléfono principal del alumno, que generalmente es el teléfono de su casa –aunque puede no serlo– y hasta a dos direcciones de correo electrónico.

La tarjeta de emergencias para los estudiantes se ha rediseñado con espacios para todos esos números telefónicos y direcciones de correo electrónico. Cuando llene la tarjeta, escriba los números con claridad para que podamos ingresarlos correctamente en nuestra base de datos. Cualquier cambio de número telefónico, ya sea del teléfono principal o de algún teléfono secundario, debe informarse a la escuela a la mayor brevedad posible.

Nota adicional: Si tiene más de un hijo en la misma escuela, no se preocupe. Connect-ED sólo envía una llamada por número; por lo tanto, no recibirá varias llamadas con el mismo mensaje. La excepción a esto son los mensajes de notificación de asistencia escolar que serán enviados por cada niño que esté ausente.

GLEN BURNIE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT PARKING

In as much as the Anne Arundel County Public Schools provide adequate, safe bus transportation to and from school, it is expected that the majority of students at Glen Burnie High School will use this mode of transportation.

The Board of Education of Anne Arundel County is not responsible for damage to any motor vehicle parked on Board of education property at any time. The Board does not carry insurance to cover vandalism, malicious mischief or other acts, which might result in damage or loss to personal property.

Some parking spaces on the Kuethe Road side of GBHS have been reserved for student use **subject to regulations established by the school administration.**

Student parking space is limited to **SENIORS ONLY WHO MAINTAIN A 2.0 GRADE POINT AVERAGE** (16 or more credits earned as of August 25, 2008) **and students involved in a school-based early release program such as Vo-Tech or work-study.**

The school reserves the authority to TOW vehicles without PROPER PERMITS or vehicles PARKED IN RESTRICTED ZONES

Student Motor Vehicle Registration forms are available in the Main Office. All students need to bring the following:

- Signed Student Motor Vehicle Registration form
- The current vehicle registration form
- Valid Maryland driver's license
- Insurance card
- \$15.00 Permit Fee

Issuance of the Student parking permits will be in conjunction with the completion of the Parking Safety class conducted by the School Resource Officer (SRO). The class will be held on August 25th, 9 AM, in the Media Center. After September 2, 2008 parking permits may be obtained 1:55 to 2:15 in the Business Manager's Office. **(Students are still required to complete the Parking Safety Class with the SRO)**

STUDENT PARKING REGULATIONS

1. All vehicles parking on school property must display a valid parking permit.
2. The school parking decal is to be placed on the inside windshield behind the rear view mirror below the tinted area. Any other placement is invalid.
3. Replacement cost is \$5.00, no matter what the reason.
4. Students violating the Lateness To Class Policy or other Anne Arundel County Public School Policy are subject to having their parking privilege revoked.
5. Students are to park in the parking lot on the **Kuethe Road side of GBHS.**
(Students who Park along Glen Road or the Business Ed Lot are subject to being towed)
6. Students are not to go to their vehicles during the school day.
7. The school reserves the authority to **TOW** vehicles without **PROPER PERMITS** or vehicles **PARKED IN RESTRICTED ZONES.**
8. Parking violations include, but not limited to the following:
 - a. Car illegally parked
 - b. Reckless driving
 - c. Parking without a permit
9. Progressive discipline will be exercised for parking violations.
 - 1st Violation: Warning placed on vehicle

After the warning, students may be subject to the following:

- Parking ticket issued, \$15.00 fine and letter home to parent
- Parent conference with student for insubordination
- Parking privileges suspended for two (2) weeks
- Vehicle towed
- Loss of parking privileges

REGULAR ATTENDANCE AND
ACADEMIC SUCCESS

No one learns to swim without getting in a pool and a similar analogy applies to academic success in high school. Regular attendance in ALL classes each school day is essential for a student's academic success. Glen Burnie High School has adopted a goal to improve attendance and I would like to define the responsibilities that each of us has with regard to school attendance.

STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

Attend **ALL** assigned classes each day. Attend school daily unless illness or another serious reason prevents it. Provide the first period teacher with a valid note from the parent/guardian for all absences **UPON RETURN TO SCHOOL**.

PARENT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Stress to your son or daughter the necessity (requirement) for regular daily attendance.
2. Keep a record of dates absent for your son or daughter for your information.
3. Provide your son or daughter with a **VALID WRITTEN NOTE FOR ALL ABSENCES** (see sample note) **UPON RETURN TO SCHOOL**.
4. Contact the teacher, counselor, or administrator to discuss absences.

SCHOOL'S RESPONSIBILITY

1. Each teacher will keep an accurate record of pupil absences for each class.
2. Each teacher will make an effort to contact parents, by telephone or letter, when a student is not in regular attendance.
3. The school will make telephone contacts via the Telephone Notification System (TNS) for students



with extended and questionable absence. TNS calls will be made during evening hours when it is probable that parents will be at home.

4. The teachers, counselors and administrators will confer with students whose attendance is not acceptable.
5. The school will make referrals to appropriate agencies (Pupil Personnel Worker, Social Services, Juvenile Court) to seek assistance in resolving attendance problems.

It is a joint effort of students, parents, and the school staff to set standards for regular attendance, monitor attendance in classes and at school, and to work cooperatively to see that students succeed in high school. The Board of Education policies regarding attendance are reprinted in this newsletter for your information and I urge all parents and students to become familiar with these regulations.

CLASSROOM TEACHERS

Teachers are on duty from 7:10 until 2:55 daily. Teachers will normally return parent calls during their non-teaching period or after school. You may contact a teacher at school, 410-761-8950 and a telephone message will be placed in the teacher's mailbox. You may expect a response within 24 hours.

CONFERENCES

Meetings with school staff are encouraged and conferences can be scheduled at a mutually convenient time for parent and staff members by calling school, 410-761-8950, to set up an appointment. To avoid delay and inconvenience you are asked to call for an appointment.

LATENESS TO CLASS

It is the student's responsibility to be on time to each class throughout the day. If a student is not in the classroom by the time the late bell rings, the student is late to class.

The new gated campus will assist us in maintaining a safe, secure environment. The gates will be closed at 7:17 AM and reopened at 1:50 PM. Because the gates will be closed once classes begin at 7:17, all students who arrive late to school must enter through the Administration Building to sign-in before attending class.

1st UNEXCUSED TARDINESS

Student will be reminded of the lateness policy.

2nd UNEXCUSED TARDINESS:

A letter will be sent to the parent.

3rd UNEXCUSED TARDINESS:

Student will be assigned detention.

4th UNEXCUSED TARDINESS:

Student will be assigned Friday Night or Saturday Morning School.

5th UNEXCUSED TARDINESS:

Student will be suspended (2 days).

NOTE: Student tardies are cumulative. The overall number of tardies reported by the student's teachers will determine administrative action.

ADDRESS CHANGES

If your student's address or phone number should change please contact the Guidance Office, 410-761-8950 ext. 219, as soon as possible with the new information. Keeping your student's information up-to-date will ensure that you receive interims, reports cards, newsletters and other information in a timely manner.



EARLY DISMISSALS

When your student must leave school early please follow these steps to help ensure that the dismissal will be handled in an efficient manner:

- Note should be brought to the Attendance Office **before the start of the school day**. The note should state the date and time of departure and the nature of the appointment.
- The note should contain the student's full name and grade.
- There must be a **phone number** where a parent/guardian can be contacted for verification of the dismissal.
- **If your student has not brought a note to the Attendance Office in the morning please expect a 15-20 minute wait.**

CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) is a legal, organized way for the citizens of AA County and each local school to take part in examining and directing the education of children in the county's public schools. The County-wide CAC must report to the Board of Education at its regular monthly meetings. The County-wide CAC is composed of 1 representative from each local CAC and concerns itself with issues having county-wide implications. A local CAC is organized in each school for the purpose of working on local issues and individual school concerns. Glen Burnie High School has had an active CAC for many years. Get involved, be informed, and have a voice in GBHS's CAC. The first CAC meeting of the new school year is set for Monday,

6:30 PM, in the Administrative Conference Room.

APPROPRIATE ATTIRE

Students have the right and responsibility to choose their attire and to arrange their attire and to arrange their personal appearance in a manner which is healthy, safe, inoffensive and not disruptive to the education process. Accordingly, students are prohibited from wearing clothing, hats, jewelry, book bags or other articles of personal appearance which:

- Depict profanity, vulgarity, obscenity or violence
- Promote use or abuse of tobacco, drugs or alcohol
- May create a health or safety hazard
- May create a significant risk of a material and substantial disruption to the education process or the operation of the school.

In addition, except in individual cases as approved by the principal of the school, the following specific items are not permitted:

- **Bare feet**
- **Hats, caps, hoods, or other headwear except as required for health, safety or religious purposes. This includes bandanas, headbands, skullcaps, and do-rags. LEAVE THEM AT HOME.**
- **Clothing worn in such a manner so as to reveal bare skin or underwear between upper chest and mid-thigh.**

Additionally, no coats or jackets, including warm-up or sweat jackets are permitted to be worn during the school day.

1. When there is evidence that a student's attire or personal appearance violates this policy, the principal, or principal's designee, shall intervene and take corrective actions, including, but not limited to, requiring that the student remove or change the item, taking reasonable steps to notify the student's parents of the violation and, for repeated violations, initiating progressive discipline for insubordination as appropriate, which may include suspension from school.

2. This policy shall apply to all students in all school buildings during the regular school day and at such other times and locations as designated by the principal, including in school buildings and on school grounds; on all school buses and other school vehicles' and at all school, school-related or Board-sponsored activities, including, but not limited to, school field trips and school sporting events, whether such activities are held on school property or a location off school property, including private business or commercial establishments.

SCHOOL PICTURES

The official school photographer will be at GBHS on August 30th and August 31st to photograph 9th, 10th, and 11th students. School photo identification cards will be made from these pictures. Students may purchase picture packets if they wish. Information about costs and packet options will be given to students the first week of school. Make-ups will be taken on October 5th. If a senior has not received an appointment card for their senior pictures please contact **Life Touch, 410-644-7700**.



ELECTRONIC DEVICES

The staff is concerned about the number of electronic devices which have been showing up at school. **THESE DEVICES ARE NOT NECESSARY FOR THE INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAM AND ARE PROHIBITED BY SCHOOL POLICY.** Any student found bringing electronic devices to school will have them taken by the staff and the device will be held for **PARENTS TO RECLAIM AT THE END OF THE SCHOOL YEAR.**

CELL PHONES



Students are prohibited from using, activating or displaying personal electronic communication devices on school property or at school sponsored activities during the school day unless approved by the school principal for a specific educational and/or administrative purpose.

LOCKERS

Students must provide a combination lock or key lock to secure their locker.

FEDERALLY CONNECTED SURVEY

On Monday, October 1, 2007, your child will be bringing home a Federal Impact Aid Survey form. Please fill out the information requested on the form and either mail it to Anne Arundel County Public Schools (AACPS) or return it to your child's school. The form will be inside a self-addressed, stamped envelope for its return. This is a multiple child form and will hold up to five of your children's names. Should you have more than five children, please utilize a second form that you can either obtain from the school or download from the AACPS website, www.aacps.org, on September 28. We will also be using our Connect-Ed Automated Telephone Notification system to remind you about the significance of completing this survey and returning it. The school system receives approximately \$3 million from the Federal government in support of our children after the forms are processed. SAFETY

MORNING: 6:55 TO 7:17 AM

Parents and others who drive students to school will use the **Keuthe Road side of campus**, along the Industrial Arts and Administration Buildings. **Glen Road will be closed to traffic other than busses and faculty.** Other vehicles will be rerouted to Keuthe Road to ensure the safety of students getting on or off busses.

AFTERNOON: 1:55 PM

Please do not enter school bus loading areas at dismissal time. Wait until the buses have left. If it is necessary for you to pick up your children at the end of the school day, please make arrangements to pick them up after the buses have departed. **DO NOT ENTER SCHOOL BUS LOADING ZONE (GLEN ROAD) BETWEEN 1:40 PM AND 2:15 PM.**

BUS TRANSPORTATION

The schedule for buses will be published in the Maryland Gazette. Bus route descriptions will also be available on the AACPS web site (www.aacps.org) prior to the August 25, 2008 school opening and for a short time thereafter. Students are reminded that they are to be discharged from their bus only at their regular stop or at their school. They may not get off at another stop to visit with a friend.



EXCEPTIONAL TRANSPORTATION REQUEST FORMS

These forms are available in the Business Manager's office. Transportation arrangements are to be consistent for each day (morning and afternoon) for the duration of the time period requested. Approval is also contingent on the space being available on the affected bus.

SITUATIONS THAT WILL NOT BE APPROVED ARE:

- Community athletic practices/games.
- Scout or club meetings.
- Music lessons.
- Religious training classes.
- Doctor or dental appointments.
- Visiting a friend.
- Avoiding integration.
- After school employment (i.e., baby sitting).

Exceptional transportation requests are to be submitted not less than **five (5) school days prior to the date** exceptional transportation is to commence.

During the first week of school, your child will be bringing home a number of forms for you to fill out. One of those forms will be the multi-copy Emergency Notification Form. Please make sure this form is completed and returned promptly. The Emergency Form gives us the ability to notify you quickly in the event your child becomes ill or is injured at school. **Please make sure you provide alternative names and numbers of those designated to pick up your child if we are unable to reach you.**

MEDICATION

If your child needs to take medication of any kind (prescription or over-the-counter), there must be a signed Medication Form for the 2008-2009 school year. No medication is to be accepted by school personnel or allowed to be self-administered under the supervision of school personnel without the receipt of the appropriate medication authorization form completed by the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) and physician in its entirety without deletion or alteration. Students are not allowed to carry any medications with them unless the completed form is on file in the Health Room. This allows the student to stay in school more comfortably and have less days absent from school. Extra forms are available in the Health Room if you should need them. **The school system reserves the right to refuse to accept, administer, or supervise self-administration of any medication.**

POLICY CONCERNING ILL STUDENTS GOING HOME FROM THE HEALTH ROOM

Parents must enter GBHS at the main entrance to the Administration Building.

A parent/guardian must physically come into the Health Room to sign-out their student.

No students will be allowed to walk or drive themselves home. They must go home only with a parent /guardian.

Students must remain in the Health Room until their parent/guardian arrives and then will be allowed to go to their lockers, if necessary.

RESPONSIBILITY FOR INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

- I. All instructional materials required by the course of study and not becoming the personal property of the student will be supported by public funds.
- II. Students will be held responsible for the careful use and protection of the books, materials, and equipment loaned or assigned to them. Upon request, the student will return these items in good condition, allowing for wear from normal usage:
 - A. The student will be required to pay for loss of or damage of books, materials, and equipment. However, the student will not be held liable for the loss or damage if the principal has determined that the loss or damage is due to

- fire, theft, or vandalism by another individual.
- B. The principal and the student may develop a plan whereby the student can perform service for the school in lieu of cash payment.
 - C. Fines will not be assessed for failure of the student to return items by due date.
- III. Each textbook loaned to a student will be identified by an appropriate school stamp.
- A. The student will be held responsible for its careful use and for its protection with an appropriate cover.
 - B. The student will be required to pay for loss of the textbook or for any damage beyond ordinary wear.
 - C. The student will be required to return the textbook promptly upon request or upon withdrawal from school.
 - D. Instructional materials may be withheld at the discretion of the principal until all financial obligations are met.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Glen Burnie High locks ONLY will be used in the locker rooms. Locks will be provided to the students at a rental cost of \$1. Students will be responsible for returning locks and may be charged an obligation if not returned. P.E. uniforms are \$25.00.

MEDIA CENTER

Glen Burnie High Media Center is open Monday-Thursday, 7:00 AM to 3:00 PM and Friday 7:00 AM to 2:15 PM. Students are encouraged to use the Media Center, not only for reference and informational needs, but also for personal enrichment. GBHS students are welcome to use the Media Center before, during lunch and after school, in addition to scheduled class visits. Students have access to our print collection of fiction and non-fiction, daily newspapers, and magazines as well as the Internet and online databases. The Media Center also offers students the opportunity to explore college and career options through books, catalogs, and college videos.

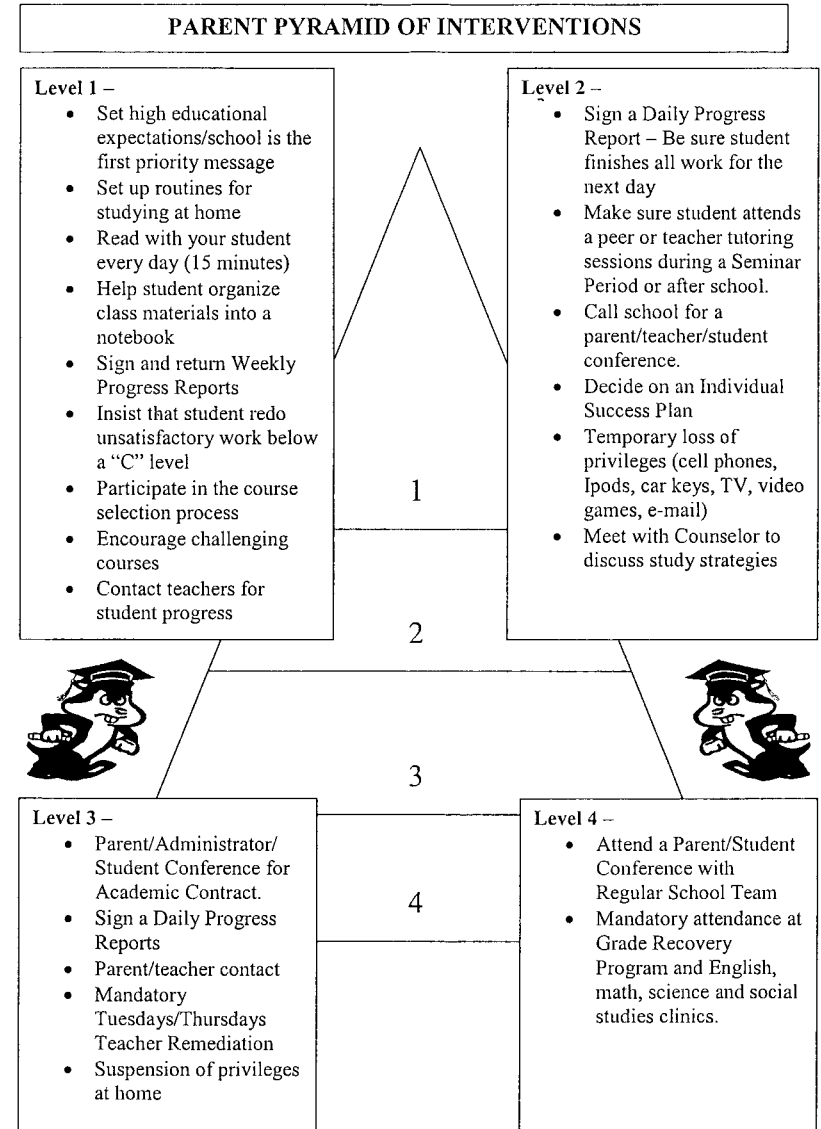
ATTENTION STUDENTS AND PARENTS!

Inclement Weather and Emergency School Closings

This calendar has four days built in at the end of the school year for emergency closings, making the school year 184 student days and 195 teacher days. Any emergency days not used shall be deducted from the June closing date. Additional emergency closings shall be made up as follows:

- Additional emergency closing days will be made up by adding on days to the June closing date.
- If emergency closings fall on January testing days or the teacher workdays, secondary schools will reschedule so that there are four consecutive testing days followed by two teacher workdays. This scheduling affects all schools.

Semester Tests and Examinations

Extracurricular activities, practices, and club activities shall be scheduled at the end of the regular school day for not more than 90 minutes on the evening prior to the day of semester tests and examinations for high schools.

* Religious Observances

Tests and examinations shall not be scheduled on the day of a major religious observance. Tests and examinations for evening high school shall not be scheduled on the day a religious observance begins. Jewish Holiday dates are set according to the Hebrew Lunar calendar; they begin at sundown on the preceding evening and conclude at sundown on the dates noted. No school-based activities shall be held after sundown the evening before the holiday.

Appropriate Exercises

Schools shall devote a portion of the day to appropriate exercises on the following dates: Oct. 12 - Columbus Day; Nov. 11 - Veterans' Day; Jan. 15 - Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday; Feb. 12 - Lincoln's Birthday; Feb. 22 - Washington's Birthday; April - Arbor Month; May 25 - Memorial Day; and any other day of national significance. When schools are closed, appropriate exercises should be held on the preceding Friday.

IMPORTANT NOTICE ABOUT IMMUNIZATIONS

Dear Parent/Guardian:

According to Maryland (COMAR) regulations for the 2008-2009 school year, all students enrolled in preschool through twelfth grade must be in compliance with minimum vaccine requirements to enter school (See inset Vaccine Requirements Chart below). **Additional immunizations may be recommended by your health care provider for good preventive health.**

In addition, **foreign-born students** must present documentation of a tuberculin skin test (Purified Protein Derivative-PPD) administered in the U.S., before entering the Anne Arundel County Public School System.

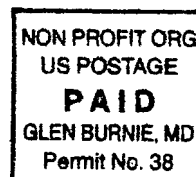
