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

Josh Carroll
South River High School

osh Carroll has worn many hats throughout his impressive 17-year career as an educator. Though he started his career as an English teacher, his passion could not be contained to the classroom. With a desire to richly touch as many students as possible, Carroll became involved in countywide curriculum writing as well as athletic coaching.

"Years ago, I focused solely on classroom performance; but, with experience as a coach, I have learned that setting high expectations for students in and out of the classroom leads to students setting high expectations in life," Carroll said.

Such expectations led him to pursue even more responsibility. "When the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) program was introduced to South River, Josh was the first person I asked to take on the challenge to build and grow the program," South River Principal Will Myers said. "The program took off and grew because of his personality, drive, and organization. It thrives today because of the foundation he established."

After leading South River's AVID program for six years, Carroll was tapped to join the school's highly sought-after and accomplished STEM magnet program. In a role where he is compelled to stimulate and foster some of the county's brightest minds, "he challenges his students to think critically, to be creative, and to go beyond the obvious, while presenting material in the most interesting and engaging manner," Myers said.

His talent and dedication recently led to his appointment as the interim department chairperson for the school's STEM program. However, the demanding role has not kept him from still being active as a coach, mentor, and chairperson of several school committees. "Mr. Carroll makes great things happen," Myers said.

"Great teaching begins with forming positive, meaningful relationships with students. Purposefully, I create time to get to know my students and to let them know me. I want my students to see me as trustworthy, caring, and dedicated to their success. More importantly, I want them to be dedicated to their own success."



Sally PazyMiño Wilson

Tyler Heights Elementary School

ome may say that six years in an occupation is a short amount of time to make a mark on an industry. In the case of Sally PazyMiño Wilson, her colleagues would likely say that her career, her school, and her students are six years stronger because of her influence.

She surely has the accolades to prove it. Wilson has been recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as part of the White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanics for outstanding instruction and community collaboration. She has also shared her award-winning approach on a global scale as a presenter at an international conference for ESOL educators.

Such acclaim has allowed her to assume leadership roles such as Equity Liaison and a member of the school's Vision Taskforce. Her skills also make her a sought-after professional confidante.

"Colleagues regularly seek out Ms. Wilson as a model for teaching techniques and equitable strategies," Tyler Heights Elementary School Principal Julia Walsh said.

With a four-point strategy for success, "Wilson's smile radiates 'Tyler Pride,' and she shares her passion each day to continue to push our school forward," Walsh said. Through high expectations, engaging instruction, parent involvement, and building student confidence, she prepares, molds, supports, and uplifts her students.

Her approach has proven to be a winning combination for not only her students, but the entire Tyler Heights school community. She attends and provides a strong presence at Annapolis Education Commission and PTA meetings, Title I extracurricular events, and parent workshops.

"I hold four elements sacred in my classroom: high expectations help students to achieve; engagement and differentiation result in increased mastery; parent involvement is paramount to student success; and a culture of student dignity and value helps students to flourish."



Stacey Scofield
Walter S. Mills-Parole Elementary School

chools are often the epicenters of our communities, and Walter S. Mills-Parole Elementary School is a shining example of this belief. At the very heart of this really important place you'll find Stacey Scofield, whose compassion for her students and school community dictates her every move.

"It is my love for these students and community that makes teaching more than a job. It is my passion, my joy," she said. Throughout her 20-year career, she has made it a point to serve in areas where she felt she was needed the most. Those needs led her to volunteer and teach GED classes at the local detention center, as well as provide home instruction for an ill student.

A heart so big cannot be contained, and Scofield is quick to help wherever she can. From participating in the Girls on the Run program to mentoring at the Boys & Girls Club and serving on several school committees, the giving never stops. Then there's her day job, where the students are always excited and in a hurry to get to their media sessions.

"When you walk into our media center, you will see students engaged in working on computers using an online database to research a topic, preparing a speech and using media texts to support their ideas, creating 3-D objects with a special printer, or lounging in the corner immersed in a great book," Mills-Parole Principal Ginger Henley said. "Students continually ask to visit the media center so that they can spend time with Mrs. Scofield. She has instilled a love of learning in our students."

Scofield has also earned her stripes among her colleagues. She often delivers professional development and gives of her personal time to keep the school's staff abreast of the latest technological supports and tools.



Timothy Smith
Folger McKinsey Elementary School

hysical education has evolved into so much more than a recreational break from the rigors of core classes. Astutely, today's physical education teacher balances and builds connections between traditional classroom lessons and the many wellness attributes that will enrich students' lives. With that in mind, Timothy Smith is not only a role model of healthy choices, but an exemplary modern physical education teacher.

"On many occasions, I've teamed with talented colleagues to scaffold critical concepts across a variety of subject areas," Smith said. "Having students complete exercises according to a specified number of repetitions listed on graphing cards has allowed our students to interpret mathematical data. Identifying biomechanical terms such as 'force' or 'acceleration' and discussing how the application of those concepts results in the improved performance of certain kinetic skills, builds vocabulary and draws comparison to science."

Such practices got the attention of the CBS This Morning show, which visited with Smith last spring to chronicle the innovative, dynamic instruction and active learning that his students and parents alike have come to love.

"The gym is right across from the school office and every time a parent is in the main office, they get a glimpse of Mr. Smith in action," Folger McKinsey Principal Lenora Fox said. "Nine times out of ten, parents are transfixed — they can't help but listen or take a look because, just like their children, they too are engaged."

Smith's work has also been recognized by the Maryland Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance. He was a 2015 recipient of the Simon McNeely Award, which honors state educators for instructional excellence and extensive community contributions. Those community contributions include organizing a cup stacking tournament that annually attracts more than 200 young people from across the country.

"Establishing personal relationships with all of my students is something that I take great pride in; and creating a lasting impression on their learning, regardless of any cognitive inhibitions, emotional insecurities, or physical limitations, has always been my most valued tool as an educator."



Denise Stephanos

Arundel High School

o the benefit of her family and students alike, Denise Stephanos brings a whole new meaning to the term 'home school connection.' As the mother of a daughter with Down Syndrome, Stephanos has used her skills and passion as an educator to help her daughter develop. Symbiotically, her efforts as an advocate for her daughter have made her a well-rounded teacher.

"I fought for her when others would not. I believed in her when others could not. I have seen firsthand what is possible when everyone perseveres including the teachers," Stephanos said. "I do the same for my students. I fight for what is best for them. I figure out a way to reach them, and I never ever give up on them. If I expect to teach my students the art of perseverance, then I must model it in my own work."

With such a penchant for advocacy, she is also a leader among her peers. As the Math Department chairperson at Arundel High School, her colleagues have also benefitted from her deep knowledge, vast experience, and creative approach. "Her support in coming up with cool and meaningful lesson plans in Geometry is invaluable," Arundel teacher Blake Wilburn said. "I especially appreciate her flexibility and her common sense approach to situations that can seem overwhelming."

Her students would agree. One of them, Sam, wrote that he likes Geometry because "Ms. Stephanos throws special stuff into the math like using maps to learn the coordinate plane." Tamaué, another student, added that "Ms. Stephanos is respectful and she motivates us to figure things out on our own."

Through her own ingenuity, Stephanos launched a math tutoring program during lunch which has helped more than 300 students this year. She also runs a regular seminar for AP Statistics and holds after-school sessions for students who need additional help.

"In order to help students reach their potential, I expose them to a large variety of educational experiences, acknowledge differences in learning styles and interest, meet them where they are, and honor each step they make in the right direction."

Debovah Flynn St. Mary's High School

eborah Flynn has been a teacher for more than 30 years and dedicates herself as much as ever to the passion and enjoyment she gains from challenging her students to excel in French. Whether through songs, food, role play, field trips, videos, or guest speakers, 'Madame Flynn" immerses her students in all aspects of another culture.

Flynn is currently the Foreign Language Department Chair and single-handedly teaches all French levels, I–V. She has taught at St. Mary's for 27 years and has been the department chair for the last 11 years. But it's in French classes where her passion is the most evident. She has also lived in France and led numerous student trips to Europe.

She earned her BS degree in French and Spanish Education from Longwood University, where she later completed her ME. As an undergraduate she studied for a year at the Sorbonne in Paris, and she has completed graduate work at numerous universities including the Institute of Spanish Studies in Valencia, Spain; Goucher College; The Catholic University of America; University of Maryland; and the College of Notre Dame of Maryland. She is certified to teach French and Spanish in grades 7–12.

"In no way can I convey Madame Flynn's gifts and talents in this letter," St. Mary's Principal Mindi Imes wrote in support of her nomination. "We believe she is the teacher of the year not only because of her expertise, dedication, and commitment to her students, but also because she loves the French language and her passion is contagious. We know that St. Mary's High School is a better place because she is teaching here."

Kelly Rampmeyer
The Summit School

f you looked at Kelly Rampmeyer's credentials, you'd assume she must have been teaching for at least 30 years. Then, when you realize she has been teaching less than one-quarter of that, you understand how much education, teaching, and volunteering she has concentrated into a short period of time.

During her seven years at The Summit School, Rampmeyer has taught English, reading, and math to lower-school students. She also coaches archery, cross country, and tennis to middle school athletes. A couple of years ago she was promoted to Assistant Program Coordinator and also serves on the school's leadership team.

Rampmeyer has a Bachelor of Arts degree from McDaniel College and certifications in Elementary and Special Education. In addition, she has led or been a part of relief and education efforts in Uganda, New Orleans, Haiti, and Nepal.

"While Kelly uses her skill and creativity to meet her students' diverse instructional needs, she has a knack for making school fun and for promoting school community spirit," said Summit School Executive Director Dr. Joan Mele-McCarthy. "For example, Kelly, an avid athlete, formed the school's first cross-country team, and first tennis team, and she brought archery to our athletics and summer camp programs. There is truly no better teacher I can think of who is more deserving of this honor."

Rampmeyer has also put her athleticism to good use in another way. Last summer, she spent over nine weeks riding her bike 4,333 miles from Seattle to Boston to raise money for Summit. She raised more than \$11,000 in support of the school's scholarship program.

"Teaching is my first passion, but not my only one. Outside of school, I have volunteered in 30 countries. I aim to bring this global perspective into the classroom, and I hope to give insight to students about life outside of Summit."



### Alma Durm

"A teacher must have passion. It is passion that brings me to compulsively dissect old lessons. It is passion that drives me to bridge the gap between school and home. I am passionate about making my students' lives better, their futures brighter, and their voices heard."

ith more than 35 years of teaching experience, Alma Durm has some proven strategies for being successful in the classroom. Such strategies, however, cannot compare to her passion and innovation. She tops those attributes with a resolve and enthusiasm to provide the very best opportunities for her students.

"She works inexhaustibly and with great joy and determination on behalf of each and every student in her classroom specifically, and in the school community," assert her colleagues, Ellen Hays, Tammy Wolanin, and Krystina Bennett. "She lives every day believing she is the voice for her students."

Committed to project-based learning, Durm has created several opportunities for her students' talents to shine not only in the classroom, but also in their school community. She began a greeting card program that combined her students' interest in crafts with their compassion for others. What started as an expression for the students to share with each other, evolved into a full-fledged operation that sells the popular cards at the school's craft fair and at the Chesapeake Arts Center. Durm has also expanded the effort to include ornaments, decorations, and sea glass jewelry among the inventory. To bring the project full circle, she created an entrepreneurship class, helping her students to develop business plans to produce and sell their items.

"Building relationships with students and staff is the glue that holds all of the essential components of teaching and learning together. My strengths as a teacher are the relationships I build every day with students and teachers in order for teaching and learning to occur at the highest level."

ancy Hack-Behringer equally values the connections she makes with students and her colleagues. As the Literacy Coach at Mayo Elementary School, she has the great responsibility of teaching the teachers and students. For her, it's a natural approach. "By supporting teachers in their learning, I am increasing student learning," she said.

No matter her title over her nearly 39 years in education, Hack-Behringer has always been an instructional leader. She provides several professional development activities throughout the year in addition to taking the lead on many school initiatives such as school improvement, testing, and student learning objective facilitation all while providing top-notch reading interventions and enrichments to students.

"She makes an impact on every child she teaches. She is the reason that many of her former students become teachers," said colleague Suzanne Jones, kindergarten teacher primary team leader at Mayo Elementary School. "There are no limits to what our students can achieve due to the support she provides and goals she sets for each student, as well as the teachers."



# Janet Liimatta Ferndale Early Education Center | National Board Certified Teacher

"I see my students through the lens of a parent. I am more of a facilitator than an instructor. I believe all of my children are capable of great things. I just need to give them the opportunity to discover their own path."

n a magical and empowering way, 23-year veteran educator Janet Liimatta has blurred the lines between parent and educator. "I want the same things for my students that I want for my own daughter," she said. With that approach, she has been able to create a learning space built on exploration and experimentation, where failure is just as essential to learning as success.

Through the design and implementation of a Nature Play Space at Ferndale Early Education Center, Liimatta personified the perseverance, persistence, and patience that she often asks of her students. Knowing that her students receive little exposure to the outdoors, she tirelessly sought funds and resources to create an amazing outdoor learning space that features a vegetable garden, native wild flower garden, teepees, a music wall, and large sand area. Her students even helped install pavers to build a hopscotch area.

"I had absolutely no prior experience in attempting anything of this magnitude," she admits. "However, the parent in me is willing to do anything for my children. Hearing the learning and laughter coming from the new space makes everything worth it."



## Elizabeth Starnes

Southern High School | National Board Certified Teacher

"A strong library media specialist not only increases student achievement, but transforms the learning community into information-powered citizens committed to literacy and prepared for the challenging demands of the 21st Century."

₹ lizabeth Starnes' typical day starts in the Media Center at Southern High School, but it always ends in the community. Although the Media Center, with its bright colors ✓ and inviting atmosphere, is a true reflection of the vibrancy she exudes as a teacher, it is her deep dedication to the Southern community that brings her praise from students, colleagues, and the school's partners.

"She goes above and beyond in everything that she does," said Lee Derrick, former Southern High School Business Advisory Board president. She puts her heart and soul into her work, as well as into supporting the school in ways that are not a part of her job description."

In addition to providing excellent resources and instruction that directly cater to the needs of her students, Starnes holds a lunchtime book club that is popular among students and staff. As the school's eCoach, she delivers technology-related professional development to staff, and is highly regarded among her peers as a team player. "Her ability to reach all learners and work with teachers' curricular needs is inspiring," said Meghan Hryniewicz, the school's signature program facilitator.



### Robert Stojakovich Magothy River Middle School

"When we give children the opportunity to be learner, problem solver, and thinker, we create opportunities where they are the stakeholders. Students need the support of a well-structured and balanced approach which compels them to pursue competence, relatedness, and autonomy."

usic teacher Robert Stojakovich uses many strategies to ensure that his students are successful. Interestingly, failure is at the very core of his approach. "On the first day of class, he asks students if they 'like to fail,'" said Magothy River Middle School Principal Christopher Mirenzi. "He then surprises them by teaching that failures are not only expected, but necessary. His philosophy is that it is through failures that we learn the most."

Just like a true conductor, he values every student as an integral part of the orchestra – just as every instrument and every note is important. He imparts this attitude on his students by often grouping instruments in unconventional ways so that the students can hear and feel their significance. "He doesn't just teach his students to play music, he teaches his students to be musicians," exclaims Mirenzi.

As a result of his all-encompassing approach, Stojakovich's students routinely earn superior ratings at the county and state levels. He also offers a summer music camp to deepen students' skills in preparation for the new school year. And the teaching doesn't stop as he also holds parent education sessions to teach parents how to support their young musicians at home.

Tom Mach Archbishop Spalding High School

"The measurement of a successful adult in today's world is reflected in one's ability to utilize information, not the ability to simply know things. This is why my classroom is focused more on skills and collaboration than it is on cataloging information."

om Mach hasn't been a teacher as long as many other nominees, but he's certainly one of the leading innovators. He uses technology to complement traditional teaching methods to foster an environment of learning. As a history teacher, Mach's AP students have passed the national AP exam at an 80 percent rate, among the best in the school.

Mach has taught social studies, religious studies, and been an adviser for the yearbook for the past eight years at Spalding. In addition, he serves as the lead on the Technology Committee, provides professional development for other teachers, and moderates the Model United Nations Club.

"Mr. Mach is a continual learner who constantly seeks the best ways to educate our young people," Archbishop Spalding High School principal Lewis Van Wambeke said. "He is a resource for our educators and has emerged as a leader through his efforts to understand how technology is best used for learning. We are fortunate to have such a dedicated teacher."



Kathy Poerstel

"I am privileged to have a multi-age classroom that allows me to bond with students for two years rather than one. I find that this extra year gives me even more time to know my students as individuals and to modify my teaching to meet their needs. My classroom is set up to accommodate all learners."

athy Poerstel has taught in varying roles at Alpert Family Aleph Bet Jewish Day School for the past 15 years. She started as a second-grade teacher, became a physical education teacher when the school had that need, and later became the technology coordinator. She has been a true team player and continuously looks for new ways to make her school better for students, staff, and parents.

"When passing through Mrs. Poerstel's classroom, you are never quite sure what you will find," said Sarah White, Head of School. "Students could be pirates one day, reading stories and integrating the pirate life into their studies, or they could be engineers using a limited amount of materials to build bridges or buildings.
