hether she's teaching standard or advanced level courses, Aundrea Atwood-Starkey approaches every class every day simply with care. Through constant reflection, keen preparation, and sincere compassion, she's entrusted to help guide students who struggle as well as those who pursue the rigors of AP Calculus and AP Computer Science. Such deft ability to switch gears is not uncommon to most educators as they adjust to the needs of their students. However, Atwood-Starkey's eagerness to support her students' desires combined with her instructional talents are what make her an elite educator.

Fulfilling a growing interest by her students for more computer science offerings, Atwood-Starkey immersed herself in the subject and emerged with what is now a thriving computer science program at the school. She lends this same tenacity to other areas of mathematics, having helped to create a fully-customized Algebra I textbook for AACPS, currently playing a part in the design of Function Focus, and developing an Introduction to Logic course for the county.

"Her compassion, patience, and drive for student growth serves not just her students, but all of AACPS," says Kevin Wajek, AACPS Coordinator of High School Mathematics. "She consistently models the tenets of good teaching. She brings a strong pedagogy and willingness to give students what they need, regardless of the impact on her time or necessity to think outside of the box."

By teaching at Southern, Atwood-Starkey's educational journey has come full circle. She wholeheartedly equips herself with the knowledge, resources, and tools to give her all to not only her students, but also her alma mater.


rade three with Miss B is definitely the place to be! Current and former students alike unanimously agree that their experiences in Teresa Beilstein's class are unforgettable. From fun jingles to help students remember math facts to frequent personal journal responses for each student to gentle pushes that promote achievement, Beilstein has found a formula that gets students to love learning and succeed. She would be quick to say, however, the most important ingredient to her healthy classroom is relationship building.

While relationships with students are her first priority, she equally values strong connections with her parents and colleagues. Through classroom themes like "We are Family" that set the tone for community-building for the whole school year, Beilstein is able to show that true triumph is knowing that you are supported and loved along life's journey. "She has created a positive classroom environment that celebrates every student, regardless of ability or background," explains her colleague Rebecca Cullen, a special educator at South Shore.

To complement her compassion for every child, Beilstein works extra hard to bring fresh content and concepts to catapult student engagement. Hence, riding different types of carpet down a slide to teach about friction is not an unusual occurrence. She recently earned National Board Certification as a testament to the lengths she'll go to be the very best for her students—not just as a person, but as the consummate educator and student herself. A former student who is now thriving in middle school recently wrote, "Thanks for teaching me everything I know, not just academically, but about myself."

avid Britton balances his strong presence, tall stature, and commanding inflections with a soft, sincere, and soothing demeanor. Yet, his ability to masterfully engage and influence middle school minds is far more impressive. "As the newly appointed principal this year, I found myself drawn to Mr. Britton's classroom," admits Principal Nuria Williams. "I can always hear the excitement of student voices coming from his classroom. As I peek in, I see every student engaged because Mr. Britton designs his lessons to include both rigor and fascinating facts. Just like his sixth graders, I am hanging on every word."

"At the heart of creating (a high) level of interest in my classroom is my own passion for the sixth-grade social studies curriculum," explains the 17-year veteran educator who is also National Board Certified. "I have a profound desire to share the magnificent achievements and rich cultures of the ancient civilizations that I teach about and believe that a teacher's passion for content can be amazingly contagious among one's students. Dressing up as Julius Caesar or conducting a mock mummification of a student are not only ways to draw students in, but also a means to encourage them to delve deeper into a topic."

Britton's efforts have not only proven effective for student achievement, but he's earned tremendous respect among his students, co-workers, and community members. He is a native of the Broadneck Cluster who coaches basketball and lacrosse to not only support the youth in his community, but to also foster the essential relationships that are critical to his work.

"The deepest understanding of curriculum occurs when students find topics engaging and, therefore, intrinsically strive to gain deeper understanding. When students feel a genuine interest in what they are learning about, they feel a great deal of connection to the classroom experiences and are, therefore, more apt to take social and emotional risks, leading to increased levels of confidence, leadership ability, and collaboration among students."

Carrie Deaver Pasadena Elementary School



arrie Deaver takes the school system's mantra to heart. In Deaver's eyes, "All Means All" means using movement to awaken learning in every child. "It is my job to discover what motivates my students and excites them about coming to school every day," explains Deaver. "Every child who enters my classroom has a unique story, their own set of strengths, and distinct interests. My goal is to support students' physical, intellectual, and social-emotional development because every child, regardless of ability, should be given an equal opportunity to learn, develop, and succeed."

She promotes physical literacy and a love for movement through various techniques to ensure that every student is enjoying what they are learning. As the consummate educator, she is deliberate about collaborating with her colleagues to not only incorporate movement into core lessons, but also to reinforce core skills in physical education. In addition, she leads several clubs and wellness-focused initiatives to model a healthy lifestyle to students.

As a result, countless students, no matter their struggles or challenges, hold a common notion that Mrs. Deaver is simply awesome. And earning the 2018 SHAPE Maryland Simon McNeely Award, the highest state honor among physical education teachers, proves it. She is also a National Board Certified teacher, another indication of the ways she challenges and pushes herself in the same way she does her students.

"Mrs. Deaver always gives 110 percent. Setting high expectations, she challenges her students to achieve personal success," says Principal Jennifer Quirino.

"I believe that physical literacy is the key to being a successful student. Physical literacy is being able to move with competence and confidence. By getting to know each child and understanding their interests,

I am able to motivate my students to move, learn, and grow."

f you're looking for fun, look no further than Samantha Klenkel Wilkinson's bright and bustling classroom where the third-graders are equally bright and bustling. Add in a dose of technological engagement mixed with high expectations and the learning simply cannot be contained. Providing such an environment comes easily to Wilkinson as she views doing so as part of a student's individual rights.

"Every student deserves a teacher who is enthusiastic and gives effort to make learning fun; one who is intentional in the learning process, who cares deeply about student growth and success in all areas, and who is a champion of students," proclaims Wilkinson.

Wilkinson employs many approaches to support student needs and firmly believes that technology must be infused to fully embrace the 21st Century student. To support this belief, she conducts monthly "Tech Tuesday" sessions for school staff to keep abreast of the latest technological resources, benefiting all classrooms. Through the monthly parent technology newsletter, and by executing Chromebook Information Nights, she educates families on using technology with their children. She also incorporates STEM into her many extracurricular initiatives at the school.

"While Mrs. Wilkinson is masterful at delivering highly effective instruction, her greatest asset is her ability to build positive and productive relationships with students, parents, and colleagues," says Principal Janet Lancaster. "Mrs. Wilkinson holds each student in high esteem. She listens intently, manages with respect and love, and celebrates success for all students."

rom robotic creations to intriguing experiments, it's nonstop science in Keya Belt Robinson's class. There is one thing, however, that gets the biggest reaction from students—her smile. Her smile is what greets them every day. Her smile is what comforts and encourages them. Her smile also helped turn around the life of at least one former student. Before teaching at independent schools for the last 13 years, Robinson taught at Mary Moss Academy.

"Clearly I was in an alternative school for a reason, but I was still scared," admits former student Shauna Larmore. "I walked into her class and she was standing in front of the room smiling. I immediately felt like this wasn't going to be so horrible. When she met our class, we were counted out by many and in some ways we even counted ourselves out. However, Miss Belt came in every day and told us that we could be great." Larmore is now a thriving entrepreneur.

To the great fortune of countless students, Robinson continues to share that smile mixed with engagement, expectations, and mentorship. She pays equal attention to lesson development and delivery as to tailoring instruction to the needs of her students. All with the purpose of a bigger picture. "When I made the choice to become a teacher, I made a choice to help shape the future," she explains. "I am committed to help shape intelligent, compassionate, responsible, free thinking adults who will change the world."

"Each year, and each classroom, has laught me a different lesson. However, the main objective of each lesson is engaging students in critical thinking that serves them well beyond the classroom. Teaching is much more than a job where educators bide their time. Each teacher is a steward of young minds. As such, I desire to help my students grow academically, socially, morally, and ethically."

Ellen Bernagozzi Smith st. Mary's High School



Ithough she facilitates the school's Spanish Exchange Program, Ellen Bernagozzi Smith provides a Spanish immersion experience in her classroom every day through song, food, role play, video presentations, field trips, guest speakers and more.

"Language is a living subject: students must experience and live language in order to master it; therefore, I give real-world experience by encouraging communication and proficiency within their field of study," she explains. "Providing my students opportunities to connect the language with people and cultures gives intrinsic value to what they are studying."

Her efforts are not in vain as her students continually perform well on the AP Spanish Language and Culture exam, clamor to participate in trips abroad, and sometimes pursue Spanish at the post-secondary level. Yet for all that she pours into her students, she finds room to contribute to her profession.

"Frequently I witness fellow colleagues observing Ellen's teaching techniques so that they can adopt her best practices, which include incorporating technology effectively to increase student learning," says Principal Mindi Imes. "Therefore, I was not surprised when she was invited to travel abroad to impact educators across the globe through Connect Rwanda." Smith maintains relationships with many of the educators with whom she bonded during the initiative.

Such an experience brings Smith's ideology full circle. "I do not simply teach Spanish; I challenge students to develop the critical thinking skills, personal responsibility, and empathy that will help them excel beyond our walls," she says.

"The most important aspect of my teaching is respect for students as individuals. I strive to create a positive, comfortable, yet academically challenging almosphere in my classroom. Striking a balance between the class and the individual is essential. My job is to ignite a curiosity that compels students to challenge themselves and continue their own pursuit of knowledge."

These relationships create excitement about learning, develop trust for self-expression, and inspire passion about making music so that students become conductors of their own compositions and learning."

Sean Lane's students give him the highest compliment a student can give a teacher: "He gets us," they say. Students love going to his classes because they believe he cares about them and their success. He encourages students to be resilient and dig a little deeper when the work is hard. He is patient and compassionate even when they are not at their best. He truly cares and students can feel that.

Lane has a nontraditional teaching style that centers around students building their music skills by first learning about their personal genres of interest.
