Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

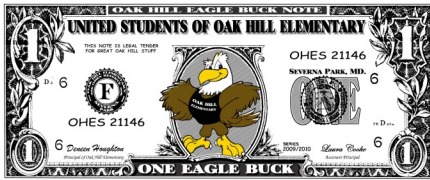

Our school will be collecting non-perishable items for the hungry in Maryland along with any monetary donations. We will be collecting canned/boxed foods and supplies to help out people in need right here in our area. Items that are most needed in our area are: canned meats, proteins, veggies, and cereals. Some examples may include items such as tuna, chicken, peanut butter, jelly, canned soups, vegetables, and pasta. **Every \$1.00 collected equals 8 pounds of food.**

Bring in items throughout the month of October. A basket will be set up in each classroom for donations. If a child brings in a canned item or \$1.00 donation during the week, they will be eligible for a "NO HOMEWORK PASS." (Only one coupon per week will be given out per child. It is up to the teacher's discretion to decide what type of homework the pass can be used for). Join us for some special SPIRIT DAYS as well.

Thursday, October 12th - "Wake Up Thursday" Students are encouraged to wear PJAMAS (NO SLIPPERS PLEASE) and bring in breakfast foods (cereal, granola bars, oatmeal, pop tarts).

Thursday, October 26th - Crazy Hair and Sock Day- Donate canned meats and proteins such as canned chicken, tuna, nuts, seeds, dried beans, and peanut butter.

Please note, if you have completed the background check within the past 2 years, your clearance is still good. Clearances expire 2 years from the date requested.

To access the on-line background investigation:

- Click the "Families" tab.
- Scroll down and look to the left hand side under "Resources/Links." Click on "Chaperones/Volunteers Background Investigations".
- Scroll down and hit "Apply for a Background Check."
- Complete Form.

Note: You are required to fill in both a date you wish to start volunteering, and a date and location of a field trip. If you do not have an exact date or are not going on a field trip, the form requires you to put something in the box. Put in a date that is 2-3 weeks out or an approximate date you think you will be starting to volunteer/chaperone.

Healthy Habits = Healthy Children

Healthy habits that decrease the spread of germs and help keep Children and families well:

1. **Handwashing** is one of the best ways to keep from getting sick
 - Wet hands with running water.
 - Add soap & rub hands together for 20 seconds.
 - Rinse.
 - Dry hands with clean paper towel.
 - If soap & water aren't available, use an alcohol based hand sanitizer.
2. **Cover that sneeze and cough** - Coughing and sneezing spread germs. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue or the inside of your elbow to prevent spreading germs to your hands.
3. **Get Moving** – Exercise helps the body fight off simple illnesses. Include active play in your child's schedule.
4. **Sleep** – Getting the right amount of sleep will help fight off colds and infections.
5. **Healthy Eating** – Good nutrition is vital for good health. Provide a variety of foods, including plenty of vegetables, fruits and whole grains at meal and snack times.
6. **Keep your Child Home when Sick**- Children should stay home until they feel better



When Do I Keep My Child Home From School?

(Although no Comprehensive list is possible, the following Conditions may be appropriate reasons to keep a student home from school)

Temperature 100° or greater	Suspected fracture
Vomiting, diarrhea	Severe pain
Shortness of breath, wheezing	Undiagnosed rash
Abdominal pain	Productive cough and fever
Red, draining eyes	Suspected communicable disease
Chest pain	Head injury
Earache	Adverse medication effect
Nuisance condition not currently treated e.g., ringworm, scabies, head lice

The online magnet application process opens at noon on October 16, 2017, and closes at noon on November 30, 2017 (CAT Centers will accept applications through March 15, 2018).

AACPS Magnet Program Overview

Please note, Magnet programs are available only to students living in Anne Arundel County.

What is a Magnet Program?

Magnet Programs, part of Anne Arundel County's *Programs of Choice*, offer motivated students the opportunity to engage in a specialized course of study that differs from the traditional curriculum offered in AACPS. Eligible Magnet students will have the opportunity to gain rigorous and relevant learning experiences in subject areas in which they have great interest.

- A student's Magnet School is determined by their home middle school. (Exception: A student's PVA High School is determined by his or her Arts Major.)
- These are public school programs and are offered at no cost to students. (Some programs may have lab, field trip, or exam fees.)
- Transportation is provided from consolidated bus stops.

What Middle School Programs are available?



The **International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme** (IB MYP) provides a student-centered education that challenges students to make connections between education and the real-world as they consider their roles in both local and global communities.



The **Performing Visual Arts** Middle School (PVA) Magnet Program offers advanced arts instruction and performance opportunities through a strong academic curriculum interwoven with the arts.



The **Science, Technology, Engineering, & Math** Middle School (STEM) Magnet Program immerses students in an interdisciplinary, inquiry-based, and technology-rich curriculum where they will apply STEM subjects to the world around them.

Students apply to these Middle School programs in the fall of Grade 5.

What High School Programs are available?



The **STEM Biomedical and Allied Health** (BMAH) Magnet Program offers students hands-on experience to learn and discuss relevant 21st century biomedical and allied health issues.

Students apply to this program in the fall of Grade 8.



The **Centers of Applied Technology** (CAT) Magnet Program offers students the opportunity to apply theory and knowledge towards skills proficiency through hands-on technical experience similar to what they would receive in the commercial/industrial workplace.

Students apply to this program in the fall of Grade 9, 10, or 11.



The **International Baccalaureate Middle Years/ Diploma Programme** (IB MYP/DP) offers a broad and balanced curriculum designed to promote student centered inquiry, creative and independent thinking, and effective communication.

Students apply to this program in the fall of Grade 8 or 10.



The **Performing Visual Arts High School** (PVA) Magnet Program immerses students in a cutting edge, arts infused college and career preparatory curriculum designed to foster effective communication and creative-critical thinking.

Students apply to this program in the fall of Grade 8.



The **Science, Technology, Engineering, & Math** High School (STEM) Magnet Program uses problem/project-based learning and cutting-edge technology to expose students to the importance of STEM subjects in the world today.

Students apply to this program in the fall of Grade 8.



Head Lice

A Real Head Scratcher For Parents

Pediculosis, or head lice, is a condition that affects approximately 6-12 million children between the ages of 3 and 12 years of age, and about one in every 100 elementary students every year.

Head lice are parasites that are generally found on the scalp, around the ears, and at the back of the neck. The adult louse is about the size of a sesame seed, and can be a reddish brown color. Eggs, or nits, are smaller and silver in color.

Head lice are not a sign of poor hygiene and they do not transmit disease. The most common symptom of head lice is head scratching, particularly at night. If you suspect your child has head lice, have them examined by your health care provider and follow their directions.

Anne Arundel county Public Schools has a No Live Lice Policy in keeping with the recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Association of School Nurses.

When a student is found to have live lice or nits less than $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from the scalp, the parent will be notified. The student can remain in school until the end of the day and must be treated by an over-the-counter or prescription insecticide shampoo before returning to school.

These shampoos should kill the live lice, but may not kill all the nits. You may need to treat again in 7-10 days.

How to get your child back to school:

- Your child must be free of live lice and all nits close to the scalp (within $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from scalp).
- Your child must be checked by school health staff before returning to class.

Bullying Form

Oak Hill Elementary School has a strong commitment to providing our students with a safe and caring environment in which to learn. The Anne Arundel County Public School system has been implementing a Bullying Prevention Initiative for the past several years, to support this commitment. This initiative focuses on teaching students skills to avoid being victimized by bullies and empowers students to take a stand against bullying in our school.

This program is most effective when the parent community, administration, staff, and students all share the belief that kindness and respect contribute to a positive environment that supports increased academic success for all students. Bullying and aggressive behaviors do not have a place in our school. When we have a common language for discussing these issues, our efforts to increase respectful behaviors and decrease incidents of bullying will have great results.

Bullying and cyberbullying, harassment and intimidation, hazing, and/or bias behaviors are unsafe behaviors that do not reflect respect for others as defined by the Code of Student Conduct. If your child is a target of one of these behaviors, you can report this using the *Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation Reporting Form* that is available on the school website or from the main office or the school counseling office. Students can also report directly to a staff member. When a situation that involves any of these behaviors is reported, staff members will respond quickly and will provide a practical, private, and safe place to report.
