Our students had several schoolwide & district assessments in the last nine weeks. Many of our youngest learners participated in mandated state screenings for foundational literacy so that we could place students in Wilson Fundations or Phonics Word Study. Students in grades 3 - 5 have completed their first district quarterly assessments for literacy, math, social studies, and science. Several students in grades 1 - 5 are participating in Fountas & Pinnell Benchmark Assessment to determine independent, instructional, and frustration levels for reading comprehension.

Federal Parent Survey

In September, parents and guardians were informed via a Connect-ED message about the collection of the annual Federal Parent-Student survey. Parents were directed to a log-in on the <u>AACPS.org</u> site to complete the annual survey. The official start date for the survey was Friday, September 29, 2023, and the survey will remain open until January 30, 2024.

Information can be found on the AACPS website at https://www.aacps.org/federalsurvey and there is a link that will take parents directly to the survey log-in page. Only those families who have not completed the survey will receive occasional reminders via Blackboard Connect.

The U.S. Department of Education requires all school systems that receive federal funding to survey

each student every year. AACPS receives approximately \$2,000,000 in unrestricted funding through the Impact Aid Grant annually. Impact Aid is a federal formula grant program designed to assist local school districts that enroll federally-connected students. Federally-connected students are children of active duty uniformed services personnel, children who live on federal property (ie: Naval Academy, Fort Meade) or in subsidized federal housing, and children whose parents are employed on eligible federal properties in Maryland such as Goddard Space Center, Social Security, White Oak, etc.

Attendance Matters

We are here to support and work collaboratively with you and your child so that he/she meets academic, social and emotional success. It is important that children attend school every day to have an opportunity to learn and grow. We understand that children miss school for various reasons. Some excused, some not excused. Please note that vacation falls in the category of unexcused, which can lead to chronic absenteeism and/or truancy. Students who fall under this category are monitored carefully and absences could impact enrollment in magnet programs at the middle level.

Per county policy students with unexcused absences may not be allowed to make up missed assignments. However, we will work collaboratively with you and your child to determine the best plan for him/her to meet success when he/she returns. Please understand, as educators, we feel no amount of "make-up" work can replace the instructional time, strategies, and tiered assignments lost during extended absences.

Research shows that missing 10 percent of the school year for any reason (excused or unexcused), or about 18 days, negatively affects a student's academic performance. That's just two days a month and that's known as chronic absenteeism. Chronic absenteeism can translate into difficulty reading by third grade, achieving in middle school and graduating from high school. When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduating.

While we understand that vacations offer experiences to our students, please try to refrain from scheduling extended vacations during the academic school year. We hope collaboratively, we can continue growing our students academically and build life-long skills that can be used outside of the classroom.





18 OR MORE DAYS

- Excused and unexcused absences represent lost time in the classroom and lost opportunities to learn.
- Missing just one day every two weeks can add up to 18 days in a year. Absences add up before you even know it.



10 TO 17 DAYS

- Students who are absent an average of 15 days a year miss a year's worth of school before their senior year.
- When students miss a day of school it actually puts them two days behind their classmates.



9 OR FEWER ABSENCES

- Students with good attendance generally achieve higher grades and enjoy school more.
- Children benefit and make the most of their educational opportunities if they attend school regularly and on time.
