



ATTENDANCE

Many of our youngest students miss 10 percent of the school year—about 18 days a year or just two days every month. Chronic absenteeism can predict lower test scores, poor attendance and retention in later grades, especially if the problem persists for more than a year.

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers. Please ensure students are coming to school each day.


FOURTH GRADE NAEP TESTING


Our Angel

Notes from the Office


Early Dismissal / Change in Dismissal -- All Early Dismissals or Change in Dismissals must be done prior to 2:00 PM

<u>Late Arrival</u> -- Any arrival after school begins at 8:00 AM, is considered tardy. You must bring your student into office to sign them in.


Absences -- Absences can either be reported through the Parent Portal Account or a note can be sent in with the student when they return to school. Emails and phone calls are not accepted.



Listening Vocabulary - the words we need to know to understand what we hear

Speaking Vocabulary - the words we use when we speak

Reading Vocabulary - the words we need to know to understand what we read

PHES February Reading Events

Reading and Math Mid -Year I-Ready Diagnostic Window Feb. 5th - Feb. 16th

Check your child's grade specific dates for both the reading and math assessments. These assessments will measure your child's growth from the beginning of the year. Please help your child get a good night's rest, and healthy breakfast. Encourage your child to put forth his or her best efforts on this assessment.

Home Reading Tips to improve Your Child's Vocabulary

Build Listening Vocabulary: Don't hold back in using words that your child may not understand. Example: Instead of saying "That clock is old," say "That clock is an antique." Ask: "Do you know what antique means?" and then explain. You are your child's first and best teacher! Explain words that are heard on TV, encountered in video games and in books that your are reading to your child.

Build Speaking Vocabulary: Ask: "Can you think of some other antiques you've seen?" "Why were they antiques?" Get your child to use this word. Once you have explained a word meaning to your child, you can have your child use the word in a sentence to check that your child understands and can use the word. Praise your child for using the new word in future conversations.

Helping your child to have a good listening and speaking vocabulary is a prerequisite for your child to become a good reader.

Build Reading and Writing Vocabulary: Reading to your child and pointing words out in print is critical to your child's reading growth. For our above example of "antique" you can put the word on a card and use it in a simple sentence. You can then have your child read the sentence and trace the word. See if your child can either dictate to you or write his or her own sentence with the word.





Instructional Focus for the Month of February:

Writing: We will learn the difference between fact and opinion so we may express our opinions and back them up with facts. As we do so, we will use the elements of a sound paper. Under Communicates Effectively, students will state their opinion, add 2-3 facts to support it, and finish with a closing statement. Under Conventions, students will use capital letters appropriately, end marks, spell phonetically, and spell with the aid of the word wall.

Science: We will be able to describe how sound helps us communicate.

Explicit Comprehension: In Reading, we will be focusing on retelling a story using key details. This includes the characters, setting, events, problem, and solution.

Foundations: We will learn and apply grade-level phonics and word skills when decoding words. FUNdations will focus on suffixes and then more glued sounds ending with-ng and -nk.

Math: We will be IReady testing in Math on February 5th and 6th. We will also be wrapping up unit 7: Meanings of Addition and starting unit 8: Meanings of Subtraction. This unit kids will be able to answer the question, How can I solve subtraction problems? They will be working with take from and take apart subtraction problems.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

Math: Measurement using inches, centimeters, yards, and feet.

Reading: <u>Fiction</u>- Understanding the plot and structure of a story, identifying character traits.. <u>Nonfiction</u>- Formatting a friendly letter, responding to a prompt using RUNOVV, understanding key details.

Writing: Opinion Writing- Students will learn the difference between fact and opinion, as well as how to construct an opinion based argument through writing.

Science/Social Studies: We Are Economic Stewards- Students will learn about different conditions and features of habitats.

FEBRUAR P

Learning Focus

Reading: This month we will begin looking at poetry. We will look at figurative language, stanzas, and understanding meaning. We will also continue reinforcing skills such as central message and responding to a prompt.

Writing: This month we are exploring opinion writing! Students will learn how to state their opinions, and back it up with reasons.

Math: This month, will be continuing our fraction unit. We will be using what we have learned so far about fractions to compare fractions with similar numerators and denominators.

Science: During science this month we will explore fossils. We will look at how fossils help us understand our past. .

Social Studies: In social studies we will learn about economics. Some topics we will cover are production, scarcity, and supply and demand.



What are we learning?

Reading: Fiction & Nonfiction Focus

We are focusing on the following skills.

- Main Idea and Detail/Theme
- Sequencing/Summarizing
- Context Clues
- Character Traits
- Comparing and contrasting texts on the same topic.

Writing:

We are working on opinion writing. Forming opinions and backing them up with reasons and evidence from credible sources.

Science:

We will be working on identifying different types of energy and how energy is transferred.

Social Studies:

We will start learning about the French and Indian War and the events that lead up to the American Revolution.

New Grading Policy per PHES:

Classwork retakes will be allowed if students miss an assignment due to an excused absence or if they score below a 60%. If a student refuses to do an assignment, they will be given a 50% and will not be allowed to retake the assignment. For retakes, the new and initial grade will be averaged to create the grade that goes into the gradebook.

Math:

We will be covering the following skills:

- Adding and Subtracting fractions and mixed numbers.
- Multiplying fractions by whole numbers.
- Decimals (tenths and hundredths)

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

<u>Math:</u> We will be finishing up Unit 8 on Dividing Decimals. Student will be exploring division of whole numbers by decimals using informal strategies. Next, we will begin Unit 9: Add and Subtract Fractions. Students use their knowledge of unit fractions and equivalent fractions to build and represent fractions with unlike denominators in order to add or subtract. Students are exposed to problems for which only one of the fractions must be rewritten, as well as those where both fractions need to be rewritten with a like denominator.

<u>Reading:</u> During the course of this unit, students are exposed to factual representations and narrative descriptions of conflict and collaboration at this point in history. Balancing the informational texts amongst the literary texts enables students to develop an awareness necessary to understand the conflicts experienced by the characters. By the end of this unit, fifth grade students will develop critical thinking skills to prevent or cope with conflict.

<u>Writing</u>: In Quarter 3 students will be learning to write Opinion Essays. They will write on topics they feel strongly about and support their opinions with reasons and evidence.

<u>Science</u>: In Q3 we will be focusing on physical science, specifically the composition of and changes made to matter. We will cover four performance expectations. Develop a model to describe that matter is made of particles too small to be seen. Measure and graph quantities to provide evidence that regardless of the type of change that occurs when heating, cooling or mixing substances, the total weight of matter is conserved. Conduct an investigation to determine whether the mixing of two or more substances results in new substances. Make observations and measurements to identify materials based on their properties.

<u>Social Studies</u>: Students will critically think about the challenges of American economic, political, and civic life from 1865 through 1910.

Art

PHES art students are working hard every day. Winter artworks are hanging in the hallways for everyone to enjoy. 1st grade students are connecting with Chinese artworks to create a koi fishpond. Second grade students are exploring how science influences art by creating masterpieces that are out of this world. Third grade artists are working together in groups to design totem poles that are inspired my Native American art. Fourth graders are studying the artist Kurt Pio and learning how to use measurement and value to create realistic gem drawings. The fifth graders are exploring how artists can change the world through positive messages. We are all excited to make wonderful things in this new year!

We had such a great ending to December exploring holiday traditions and music from around the world while understanding the form of music. All classes are continuing to develop their skills and understanding of musical elements. For the month of January, I would like to highlight our 5th graders. To end out the first marking period, students will be using the music elements to evaluate National Anthem performances in a bracket system!

Chorus

Congratulations to our chorus students and thanks for all who supported the event. There will be signs up available for any 4th and 5gh graders who wish to join in on the fun!

Instrumental Music

We look forward to more music learning in the second semester of the year. Students are reminded to keep practicing their instruments as we continue to build on the foundation we established in the first half of the school year.

Students will complete units in Rolling a Ball (Bowling), Safe Rock Wall Climbing, Hula Hoops, Individual Short Rope Jump Rope, and Long Rope Jumping during the month of January.

EEE

Students have completed their projects in first, second and third grade, and are starting the new year with new questions around how to tell stories through yoga (first), how to use mindfulness strategies to calm their emotions (second), and how to represent their family's story on an Egyptian-style stele (third). Fourth and fifth grades are hard at work finishing their final projects. These projects should be completed in the next few weeks. Fifth grade will be printing their own logos onto stickers that they will be able to use or give as gifts. Fourth grade has gotten approval to display their rock mandala public art project in front of the school. They also helped design the rock installation.
