Leadership and Motivation are highly sought-after and valued commodities in the 21st century. Teachers, Administrators, Athletic and Professional Development Coaches, and Managers continue to ask others and themselves what makes great leaders in their organizations. Many individuals believe that leadership and motivation foster ways to improve their social, professional, and personal lives. School systems, classrooms, and other organizations seek individuals with leadership ability because they believe they bring certain attributes to their organization and, ultimately, improve the outcomes of students and followers. The course is offered fully online in a format that students will find as interactive, engaging, and user friendly. We will utilize the Leadership Practices Inventory (LPI) from Kouzes & Posner (2020). Research data consistently shows that leaders who engage in the behaviors measured by the LPI are more effective and successful than those who do not. If you supply the will, the course will provide the way for fostering the ability to motivate and lead a group of individuals to achieve common goals.
