IF YOUR FRIEND HAS A PROBLEM.

- You may notice some changes in your friend
 - · wanting to be alone
 - · acting moody or angry
 - showing no interest in things that used to be enjoyable
- 2. Try to get your friend to talk to you.
- Listen
 - · let your friend do the talking
 - be calm and serious
 - · don't criticize
- 4. Share Feelings
 - · try to put yourself in your friend's place
 - · let your friend know you care
- 5. Get Help
 - try to get your friend to talk to someone whose judgement is respected, such as a parent, teacher, counselor, or relative
 - talk to your parents, teachers, or a counselor if your friend has a serious problem and is unwilling to get help
