



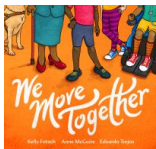



Think about things that connect us. Use social media and other outlets to spread messages and information encouraging people to do something that makes your community a better place.

		<p>In 1921, seventeen-year-old Isaiah Wilson lives in the Greenwood district of Tulsa, Oklahoma. It is a prosperous African American community sometimes nicknamed the "Black Wall Street." Isaiah may seem like a troublemaker, but he is a secret reader and poet who studies the writings of W.E.B. Du Bois and believes in the need for a black revolution. Sixteen-year-old Angel Hill, a quiet girl who follows Booker T. Washington, believes that black people will become equals through education and tolerance--not force. The two teens meet at their job at the mobile library and grow close, but their lives change forever when a violent white mob storms Greenwood.</p>
		<p>Haitian teen Fabiola Toussaint and her mother finally leave Port au Prince to live with an aunt and cousins in Detroit, Michigan. However, U.S. Immigration detains her mother, forcing Fabiola to go alone to Detroit and try to figure out how to live with her loud cousins in a new, gritty surrounding. A new school and a chance at romance are overshadowed by a terrible choice that circumstances force Fabiola to make—she can either snitch on a drug-dealing boyfriend, or she can let her mother stay in detention indefinitely.</p>
		<p>Sixteen-year-old Ana, a recent immigrant from Argentina, is working hard to learn the English language after moving to New Jersey. When she meets a cute American boy named Harrison and a boy named Neo from Greece in her ESL class, she begins to have confusing feelings for both of them. As she begins to learn more about the English language, she also must sort through her feelings for each of them. <i>Love in English</i> is witty and effervescent, while telling a beautifully observed story about what it means to become “American.”</p>
		<p>Contains a collection of short stories from Mexican American authors that discuss their experiences emigrating to the United States, living among both cultures, dealing with racism, and creating an identity that honors both heritages.</p>
