Characteristics of Tier One Supports/Interventions



- Universal academic and behavioral supports
- Actively teaching & reinforcing (practicing) schoolwide expectations
- Clearly defined major vs. minor behaviors
- Using active feedback & encouragement for students that display the expectations
- Using a range of strategies to discourage undesired behaviors
- System that actively monitor tier one supports and structures


Examples of Tier One Supports/Interventions



- Community Building Circles
- Universal Design for Learning (UDL)
- Universal Classroom Discipline Ladder
- Classroom vs. Office Managed Behavior Chart
- Scheduled Teaching & Practice Sessions of Schoolwide Expectations -at Natural Entry Points
- Schoolwide Acknowledgement System
- Second Step Lessons
- Differentiated Instruction (DI)


Characteristics of Tier Two

Supports/Interventions




- Support for a targeted small group- 15% of your school population
- Support for students with mild behavior concerns
- Increased explicit instruction of expectations and skills (academic & behavioral)
- Students in this group need additional prompting, reinforcement & acknowledgement (arrow up)
- Home/School Communication
- Gradual Release from support



- Behavior Intervention Support

Characteristics of Tier Three Supports/Interventions



- Support for students that require an individualized assessment to design a unique comprehensive academic or behavioral plan- 5% of your school population
- Support is provided by staff with expertise to support individual plans
- Coordinated with parents or guardian & sometimes with community or outside agencies
- Students in this group need intensive prompting, reinforcement & acknowledgement (arrow up)



Factors


Identification of environmental and other factors that contribute to, or predict, the occurrence or non-occurrence of the behavior

FBA, continued...



Define the behavior

- Process for developing an understanding of a target behavior
- Multiple team members collect & analyze the data
- Consent must be provided by the parent
- Can be done for any student
- Must have clear definition of the problem behavior



BIP



"... proactive, data-based, structured plan that is developed as a result of a functional behavior assessment which is consistently applied by trained staff to reduce or eliminate a student's challenging behaviors and to support the development of appropriate behaviors and responses."






